## COME TO BURLINGTON, VERMONT...LAKE CHAMPLAIN'S QUEEN CITY!

Don't miss the opportunity to enjoy the Thirty-Sixth Annual Meeting of the Aquatic Plant Management Society in idyllic surroundings! What could be more pastoral than summertime in southern New England? With breathtaking views of the Adirondack Mountains to the west, and backed by the Green Mountains to the east, the APMS meeting is being held in Vermont's largest city, Burlington, nestled along the shores of scenic Lake Champlain. Lake Champlain, or "petonbawk" (waters that lie between), as the Abenaki Indians called it, is 120 miles long and 12 miles across at its widest point, making it the sixth largest freshwater lake in the United States.

The meeting will be held at the Radisson Hotel in Burlington, from July 14-17, 1996. While in Burlington, there will be countless ways to explore the city and the region's nich cultural and natural heritage. There are spectacular views of the lake from the hotel and across the street is Burlington's Waterfront Park and eight mile recreation path. Also within easy walking distance of the hotel are the Lake Champlain Basin Science Center; the Lake Champlain Ferry Dock where you can board a boat that takes you across the lake to New York State; the Flynn Theatre for the Performing Arts; and Church Street Marketplace, an historic four-block pedestrian mall with over 160 unique shops, restaurants, outdoor cafes and street vendors. A popular spot near Church Street is the Vermont Pub and Brewery, famous for its selection of locally brewed beer.

Within a short drive of the Radisson Hotel there are many other places well worth visiting. Known as "Vermont's Smithsonian," the Shelbourne Museum houses one of the nation's most extensive collections of 18th and 19th century folk art, artifacts and architecture. The museum's 45 acres are beautifully landscaped and you can easily spend an entire day there. The Lake Champlain Maritime Museum offers a unique opportunity to learn about the nautical history of Lake Champlain. Climb aboard a replica of the 54-foot Revolutionary War gunboat, the Philadelphia, or discover why Lake Champlain contains the best collection of wooden shipwrecks in North America. Visit nearby Button Bay State Park to hike through an old growth oak-hickory woodland. There you can also see fossils of animals that lived 400 million years ago when the area that is now the Lake Champlain Basin was part of a shallow tropical sea. A little farther north is Missisquoi National Wildlife Refuge, where visitors can enjoy a quiet respite and view the wide variety of plants and

wildlife inhabiting the preserve.

On Monday, spouses and partners will have the opportunity to relax on the lake, aboard the Spirit of Ethan Allen II, for a 1 and 1/2 hour narrated scenic cruise and brunch. The ship's crew provides a lively account of the lake's history, geology, and Indian lore as the Spirit cruises to Lone Rock Point, Juniper and Dunder Islands and Shelbourne Bay. It remains to be seen whether anyone on the cruise will spot "Champ," Lake Champlain's legendary sea-serpent. This year, the Tuesday night Awards Banquet is being held at Shelbourne Farms on the shore of Lake Champlain. Both the landscape (designed by Frederick Law Olmstead) and the buildings of the 1,400 acre farm are on the National Register of Historic Places. Upon arrival at Shelbourne Farms we will have a 20-30 minute guided tour of the estate. A New England barbecue will follow, catered by the world renowned New England Culinary Institute. A local band will provide great music for your dancing and listening pleasure!

Since the Aquatic Plant Management Society, Inc. has never held their annual meeting in New England, this will be a truly memorable occasion. The local arrangements crew is working very hard to make sure the Society will come back again, but don't miss out on the 1996 Meeting...a landmark event!



### SUMMARY OF THE MID-WINTER BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MINUTES

The meeting was called to order at 8:15 a.m. on Sunday, February 4, 1996. A quorum was present, however due to the severe weather the following officers and/or directors were absent: Steve de Kozlowski (Joe Zolczynski represented him by proxy), Fred Nibling, David Tarver (represented by Don Doggett). After the recognition of the proxies the minutes of the July Board meetings and the annual business meetings of the Society were approved on a motion by Haller, seconded by Fox.

President Mc Nabb brought the Board up to date regarding several items, including information on the up coming meeting in Burlington, Vermont, the funding issues facing the aquatic plant management industry, particularly federal funding of programs, new chair assignments and correspondence. Discussion continued in depth regarding future efforts related to lobbying the federal government. Additional organizational efforts are encouraged to be able to continue effective grass roots lobbying. Another item discussed during the President's Report involved the development of an Aquatic Plant Management Society Home Page on the Internet. It was authorized on a motion by Stocker and a second by Johnson to spend up to \$200 annually for the establishment and maintenance of a Home Page.

The Secretary's report was brief and as a result the Past President's Committee was asked to review the annual calendar of the Society and the Standard Operating Procedures.

The Treasurer's report covered a number of different topics, including the level of detail the Board wished the financial reports to include. It was determined that the reports at least for the near future would be very specific in order to allow for trends to be tracked; the alternative discussed was to prevent the reports from being cumbersome due to the level of detail expressed in them.

The Finance Committee was asked to develop recommendations regarding the more profitable investment of the Scholastic Endowment funds, which performed sluggishly over the past year. At this point it was moved by Fox and seconded by Haller to approve the Treasurer's and Secretary's reports.

Committee reports were then presented. Kurt Getsinger gave a report of the scheduled activities for the 36th Annual Meeting in Burlington, Vermont, July 14-17, 1996. There was discussion of the arrangements and potential sponsors for the meeting. With this information it was moved by Haller and seconded by Stocker that the registrations for the Annual Meeting be set as follows:

Delegates: \$80 Pre-registration \$95 At the meeting

Spouses: \$60 Pre-registration \$75 At the meeting

Kurt expressed his thanks to Holly Crosson who was unable to attend the Board meeting due to the weather. Holly has been instrumental in organizing the activities for the Burlington meeting.

Kurt also took this time to give the Program Committee report. The program will include sessions on plant management and ecology in New England and the Northeast He is working on some interesting keynote speakers. The call for papers will appear in the next newsletter.

Alison Fox provided the International Contacts report and indicated that questionnaires will be going out soon to the international mailing list to better develop that database.

Alison also presented the reports of the Regional Chapters and Student Affairs committees. She indicated that she is in contact with the regional chapter Presidents and that she would check with them regarding chapter Home Pages.

The Student Affairs committee budget was approved previously at \$1875. The uses of the scholastic endowment for students was discussed. Finally Alison indicated that next year due to her other responsibilities with the Society we will need a new Chair for the Student Affairs Committee.

Mike Stewart presented the report of the Legislative committee. As a result of this discussion as well as the President's report, it was moved by Haller and seconded by Doggett that software be purchased that will allow the membership database to be correlated to the Congressional Districts. The motion passed with one abstention. This will allow us to better respond when aquatic plant management issues are being considered by Congress.

The Nominating committee report was presented by Joe Zolczynski as proxy for Steve de Kozlowski. The slate of officers is as follows:

Don Doggett presented the Site Selection committee report. During this discussion it was moved by Stocker, seconded by Haller that Memphis be removed from the list for the 1998 meeting site due to difficulty in finding reasonable hotel accommodations. The Motion passed unanimously. Don was requested to come up with some alternative sites for the July Board meeting.

Shortly after the committee reports it was moved by Haller and seconded by Zolczynski that the meeting be adjourned.

### 1996 SCHOLARSHIP GRANT

The South Carolina Aquatic Plant Management Society is seeking applications for its annual scholarship grant. If an appropriate applicant is found, the Society will award a \$2,000 grant at its Annual meeting in August 1996. Grant funds may be used by the recipient to cover any costs associated with education and research activities.

Eligible applicants must be enrolled as full-time undergraduate or graduate students in an accredited four year college or university in the United States. Course work or research in the area of aquatic plant management or aquatic ecology related to the Southeast is also required.

Applications must be received no later than April 1, 1996 and will be evaluated on the basis of relevant test scores (ACT, SAT, GRE, etc.), high school and/or college grades, quality and relevance of research or course work, a proposed budget, information obtained from references, and other related considerations. Other factors being equal, preference will be given to applicants enrolled in Southeastern and South Carolina institutions.

The successful applicant may be requested to present an oral report on research activities at the Society's Annual Meeting.

### Aquatic Weed Control, Aquatic Plant Culture and Revegetation Short Course May 14-16, 1996 Fort Lauderdale Research and Education Center

The Aquatic Weed Control, Aquatic Plant Culture and Revegetation Short Course, to be held at the Fort Lauderdale Rolling Hills Hotel on May 14-16, 1996, will offer aquatic plant managers and technicians new information on aquatic weed and plant identification and biology, as well as control techniques including biological control herbicide characteristics, herbicide application and regulatory information.

#### Program Information

Topics to be discussed include: plant identification, plant propagation and revegetation, biological control of weeds and herbicide technology. CEU points, as well as a commercial pesticide application certification examination, will be offered for short course participants.

The Rolling Hills Hotel is the official conference site. A special rate of \$45.00 per night with one to four people in a room is available for participants of the Aquatic Weed Short Course (rate is subject to 9% sales tax). ## CHANGES TO AQUATHOL K<sup>®</sup> LABEL

This past fall Elf Atochem of North America announced three amendments to its Aquathol K<sup>®</sup> Aquatic Herbicide label. The amendments include:

- Removal of the twenty-four hour swimming restriction. The amended label has no swimming restriction.
- Removal of the skull and crossbones and poison signal word.
   (See the current Material Safety Data Sheet for shipping information).
- Revision to the Precautionary Statements to include removal of the wording, "Fatal if absorbed through skin."

The Environmental Protection Agency granted these amendments due to new data generated by Elf Atochem in support of Aquathol K<sup>®</sup>.
