#### A Message from the President Lewis Decell

Our meeting in Asheville, NC, was very successful as well as eventful. Despite the last minute notifications of alterations due to hotel renovations, the local arrangements committee did an excellent job and was challenged above and beyond the normal call. Special recognition goes to Eric Barkemeyer, who not only stepped in late to take over Local Arrangements, but was on the firing line until the last day. As a result of meeting with the hotel management, the Society received a 10% reduction in our convention bill. We had 235 registered attendees. 168 delegates - 49 guest delegates - 8 students and 10 sustaining members. There were 20 booth spaces, and thanks to Joe Bondra for the excellent job of getting the booths into the theater lobby and making everything work.

Through several years of effort by the Finance Committee, the finances of the APMS are now in better condition and returning more on our investments than ever before. We also have a solid accountability system in place.

As we enter the new millennium, I believe we still have some potential challenges ahead.

First, I think we need to ask ourselves the question, "Are we positioned for the future ?" To answer this question, we will need to determine if the present trends will continue into the future, and then evaluate both our past and our present position, and what we are, what we are about and do we need to re-position our organization and our vision.

I have formed an Ad Hoc Committee for Strategic Planning. It will be the task of this committee to evaluate our present National position and to develop a long-range strategic plan for the future. An integral part of this strategic plan will be a long range financial plan that looks at investing our resources in those things that will promote progress in our future. We are a business, and our financial resources dictate that we operate more like a business. I am not referring to investments that make more money out of money -- I am referring to investments that provide us with stronger National visibility, and closer, more productive ties with other National organizations that have similar goals and interests.

We are essentially an organization supported almost solely by the chemical industry. I do not view this as inherently good or bad. I am concerned, however, that if some past and current businessmerger trends continue, the result could be that there would be only one, or two, chemical companies remaining in the aquatic field; and realistically, our support base could be eroded. The question is -- will that effect us? Playing the devil's advocate, we might consider a broadening of our interest base, to include areas that are closely related to aquatic plant management.

Equally important to me is the relationships between the National organization and the Chapters. While associated, it is my observation that we all operate independently. I am going to challenge our Vice President and the Chapter Presidents to meet and determine ways in which the National organization and the chapters can more consistently and productively work on efforts of mutual benefit. One obvious area is education and outreach. Together, we can develop a National program that gets the knowledge to school children and the general public to ensure that they have the proper information.

One current contentious issue is the "Bass/Grass" issue. One perspective is that this issue has emerged from the public and bass anglers being armed with misinformation. After a meeting in March in Atlanta, and a second in Tallahassee in September, a decision has been made to form the Bass/Grass Alliance, a non-profit organization, with the focus on having bass anglers productively involved in the aquatic plant management decision process. Three organizations have been involved; APMS, Inc., B.A.S.S. and the American Fisheries Society. Each of these organizations will be called upon to actively participate in the future efforts of the Alliance.

We in the aquatic plant management industry are not technology limited. We are limited in the application and integration of that technology into the everyday activities that confront the general public. I think this is largely due to the fact that we have not marketed our organizations effectively. We have been and still are in a defensive posture, and the public knows much more about our failures than about our successes. This needs to change in the future, or events will overtake us. 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In a broader context, I look forward to the challenge of helping to lead the APMS into the new millennium, as an organization that will gain in National recognition, and one that will facilitate the replacement of misinformation with proper information through scientific advancement and public education.

Everyone please plan to attend the annual meeting in San Diego, CA in July, 2000. It is being organized as an international meeting, and Lars Anderson and Jim Schmidt are putting together a very good program. Hope to see everyone there.

#### 1<sup>st</sup> AERF/APMS GRADUATE STIPEND TO MICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY RESEARCHER

Dr. Mary Bremigan, Department of Fisheries and Wildlife, Michigan State University (MSU), was the recipient of a \$34,000 stipend for supporting graduate students in the study of aquatic plant management. Dr. Bremigan's students will be researching the impacts of large-scale herbicide applications on lake foodwebs. The stipend is the first of its kind in this area of aquatic plant management and will be used to support two graduate students (Ray Valley and Steve Hanson) at MSU in East Lansing, Michigan. Dr. Bremigan's proposal was chosen via a peer-reviewed selection process which included proposals submitted from the University of Washington, the University of North Texas, the University of Florida, and Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute. Funds to support the stipend were provided as a match by the AERF, the APMS, and regional chapters of APMS including South Carolina, Texas, Western, MidSouth, MidWest, and Florida.





